
The Anchor Amble

A brisk walk from Bosun's Rest to The Anchor Inn. This walk merely scratches the surface of the picturesque fishing village of Beer in south east Devon with it's charming stuff and pretty other things. It will take you within trumping distance of the world famous heritage Jurassic Coastline. Please note that shoes are recommended at all times of year. Or flip flops.



On leaving Bosun's Rest's back door turn right and right again. If you arrived by car, you will see it in front of you. Please avoid walking into it as you walk down the drive to reach the pavement. Here you should turn left and head along the pavement until you reach your first obstacle - crossing the car park entrance. It is quite possible that a poor unsuspecting day tripper will be absolutely thrilled to have spotted a space in this car park and will be flooring it to grab the space before anyone else does.
